
Writer's Corner! Quick tips for writers, young and old!

Free Writing

This prewriting activity is very helpful to overcome writer's block! To free write, you should sit down with a blank sheet of paper. Then, for a designated period of time, write continuously—include anything that comes to your mind, no matter what it is. Don't worry about proper grammar or punctuation; *just write*.
